BROTHERHOOD AWARD

Jane Howard

The Brotherhood award is given to a person who has displayed leadership in fostering understanding and promoting harmony and goodwill among all. This year's recipient is Jane Howard.

Jane was the dental assistant and office manager for the late Dr. Jack Heck for 33 years. She has deep compassion for people, especially the people of Haiti. She took her first mission trip to Haiti in 1983 as a team member from First Presbyterian Church in Port Huron. This experience took her to the impoverished Island of LaGonave located 14 miles off the mainland coast. This first exposure to the Third World culture of Haiti and the poverty-stricken, yet proud, people living in it, captured her heart.

Jane's main focus of work was in the West Indies Self Help (WISH) dental clinic in the island village of Anse-a-Galets where she performed all of the expanded duties of a dental assistant. Patients walk for hours from mountain villages to receive dental care in the small mission clinic. During her visits, Jane organized a "Port Huron Party" for 300 children in the poorest area of the village. A meal, organized games and toys were provided.

Locally, Jane has acted as a bridge builder between Haitian and American cultures by giving Haiti presentations to numerous service clubs, churches and classrooms in the Port Huron area schools. One such example is Barb Neal's sixth grade class at Central Middle School. The class eagerly awaited Jane's visits both before and after the annual trip. Mrs. Neal's class conducted fundraisers and the money raised was taken by Jane to Haiti to support the WISH feeding program. This program provides a daily serving of rice, beans and safe water to those same "Port Huron Party" children.

Jane also spreads her love around the Port Huron community and has volunteered countless hours to help with parade floats, I-94 road cleanups, the Polar Bear Plunge, and has help to raise funds for the D.A.R.E. program, Ronald McDonald House, National Kidney Foundation, Mid-City Nutrition, Carolyn's Place, the Community Foundation of St. Clair County, March of Dimes and for other individuals in our community who need a hand.

No matter if Jane is at home or trotting the globe to Haiti her generous heart is always giving. Jane is always cheerful, enthusiastic and a joy to be around. She never misses an opportunity to bring people together. Jane is a loyal friend who is dedicated to the people she loves. She is always encouraging others. For all the good she brings to our world, she is beautifully centered and humbled and never seeks or expects recognition.

CIVIC AWARD

John & Ann Kendrick

The Civic award is bestowed upon a person, business or organization that has significantly contributed time, talent or investment to make Port Huron a better place to live, work and play. This year's recipients are John and Ann Kendrick.

John and Ann have owned and operated Pollock-Randall Funeral Home in Port Huron since 1994. John graduated from Port Huron High School and Ann from Marysville High School and both attended St. Clair County Community College. They both went away to earn Bachelor's degrees and then returned to the Blue Water area in the 1980's. The Kendricks view funeral service as a servant ministry and are committed to serving "their families" at the highest level, which has earned the funeral home several national awards. They are very committed to their hometown of Port Huron and some examples of this dedication include:

- Sponsorship of many community events, the largest and most recent, include SandFest, the Port Huron Museum Storm of 1913 exhibit, and the Reflections "The American Funeral" tour bus.
- Lease donation of the "Violin House" to the School for Strings of St. Clair County when the school outgrew their original facilities. The previous rental property, which adjoins the Pollock-Randall parking lot, is now used for private lessons and ensemble practices. Violin music can be heard wafting across the parking lot on warm summer days.
- Yearly participation in the "Ride of Silence" where they lead and follow the cyclist with their funeral hearse to bring awareness to the importance of sharing the road with bicyclists.
- Semi-annual bus trips to Great Lakes National Cemetery in Holly for veterans and their families to show them the National Cemetery and treat them to lunch as a thank you for their service.
- Support of the Port Huron Police Department, especially the CAPTURE program and Honor Guard (assistance with start-up equipment purchase).

- Bringing nationally respected grief and loss experts in to do presentations for the bereaved, as well as seminars for professionals.
- Being committed to the improvement and beautification of the funeral home's external facilities and gardens helping to foster community pride.
- Financial support of many nonprofit organizations and churches, including donation of digital billboard sign advertising space.
- Attendance at many community functions as possible and encouraging staff members to be involved in and attend community events as well.
- They have given financially to many individuals/families in need.

John and Ann are both active personally in the Port Huron community as well. John currently is the Operation Transformation Board of Directors President; serves on the St. Clair County North Camp Gideon's; is the Eastern Michigan Christian Foundation Vice President; is a long-time member, past President and Hixson Award (highest honor) recipient of the Kiwanis Club of the Blue Water Area; and member and past Commander of the Port Huron Power Squadron. He has worked for many years on the commercial division of the local United Way Campaign, and is a life member of the NAACP. In the past, John has served as a St. Clair County Commissioner, Chair of the Blue Water Hospice Board, member of the Visiting Nurse Association Board, and as Chairman and board member of the Department of Health & Human Services.

Ann is a member and past President of the St. Clair County North Camp Gideon's Auxiliary; serves on the Salvation Army Advisory Board and Eastern Michigan Bank Board of Directors; and judges children's baking during the annual St. Clair County 4-H fair. In the past, Ann has been involved with the Port Huron Town Hall, the Michigan Waterways Girl Scout Council, International Symphony Orchestra, the School for Strings of St. Clair County, Port Huron Musicale, CROP walk, Blue Water Habitat for Humanity and St. Clair County Master Gardener Association.

The Kendricks have used their Pollock Randall Funeral Home business to serve the Blue Water Area and Port Huron in particular. They are very generous and support many events and organizations financially in whatever way they can. Their contributions to our community are often unseen, but John and Ann are most definitely tremendous assets to our community.

CULTURAL AWARD

Patricia Moss

The Cultural award is given to a person or group who has encouraged the appreciation and advancement of the arts or heritage of Port Huron and its citizens. This year's recipient is Patricia "Trish" Moss.

When Trish and her husband Carl moved back to Port Huron, they bought an old dilapidated house in the "red zone." Known as the historic Ballentine home, their request for a loan was turned down by three banks who said it would be impossible to restore. In fact, they did restore the house and fully furnished it in appropriate era décor. They subsequently opened it to tours to help earn money for the Port Huron Museum.

Trish can be found in her Civil War Period clothing in front of the Fort Gratiot Hospital during Sandfest where people can have their pictures taken with her and her husband. She has also gone to reenactments with her husband as the First Family of Michigan at Greenfield Village, Historic Fort Wayne in Detroit, as well to Alabama, Iowa, Pennsylvania and Canada. She also has been involved in the reenactments of the Fenian Raids that started here in Port Huron.

At St. Clair County Community Mental Health (CMH), there is a group called the *CMH Players*. This group includes individuals who receive services at CMH and includes staff and other local actors. Their goal is to reduce the stigma associated with mental illness. Recently, Trish assisted this group by allowing the use of her Ballentine home, decked out in the era décor, to film a movie. The movie was a success. Were it not for Trish's kind and generous contribution, this film could not have been made.

Trish is also known for giving a speech every Thursday at the Maritime Center at Vantage Point about the many things Port Huron has to offer.

Over the years, Trish has sat on multiple local committees devoted to improving the Blue Water Area, including the following committees: Guadalupe Day Care, Restore the Fort Gratiot Lighthouse, Sandfest and the Fort Gratiot Hospital. She has also helped out at Habitat for Humanity and Mid-City Nutrition soup kitchen.

We salute Trish Moss for sharing her passion for history and her devotion and commitment to making Port Huron a better place.

GOOD NEIGHBOR AWARD

The Good Neighbor award is given to a person who has gone out of his or her way in an unsolicited manner to help a neighbor in an extraordinary manner. This year's recipient is Gail Silvernail.

Gail is an active member of the Port Huron Police Department's Volunteer in Police Service (VIPS) program. Gail has volunteered for many projects, but one project that stands out is when she volunteered to assist with the cleanup of an elderly woman's yard who needed help. Many volunteers donated their time to do this in August 2014, but Gail went the extra mile and managed to get some local businesses to donate leaf bags and meals to feed the volunteers. Gail also worked tirelessly trying many avenues to get a fence donated, trees trimmed and was able to get a tree service to remove a tree at no cost.

After the initial yard cleanup was over, Gail noticed the elderly woman was in need of boots and clothing and again took the initiative to get some of these items for her. Gail also began to check on the woman weekly, bringing her home cooked meals and leaving her notes letting her know someone cared. When it became evident to the City's Code Enforcement Unit that the woman needed additional help, Gail was the needed bridge to get her to speak to the Department of Human Services and later the Public Guardian's Office.

Eventually, the woman's home was deemed unsafe to live in and Gail worked alongside the woman's guardian trying to assist whenever needed. She helped her get two cats neutered and found a "no kill shelter" for two more cats, thus making the woman's transition into a suitable housing environment possible. Gail even took the women out to a restaurant for her 82nd birthday.

She has worn many hats over the years from advertiser, teacher, insurance agent, troop leader, local and state historian, and board member for so many organizations to name a few.

Marcia has always been one of Port Huron's leading enthusiasts. She is a local historian whose focus has been to preserve the beauty and history of our town. She was a founder of the Port Huron Museum, involved in the Fort Gratiot Hospital project and has led the charge to preserve the local railroad bridge and Round Island Lighthouse in the Straits of Mackinac. She also introduced archeological digs to Port Huron and, of course, has been the local historian on famous persons buried in Lakeside Cemetery. Her passion for history led her to help with the Port Huron Bicentennial Committee and the State of Michigan Bicentennial celebration.

Her desire to increase cultural activities in the area, allowed her to be one of the original founders in 1959 of the Port Huron Little Theater. Throughout the years, she has also given her time and talents to the St. Clair County Community College board, the St. Clair County Community Foundation advisory board, Port Huron Hospital Auxiliary, International Symphony Orchestra, Blue Water Area Tourism Bureau, American Heart Association, Boy Scouts of America, Port Huron/Marysville

Chamber of Commerce, Port Huron Estate Planning Council, Port Huron Rotary and the list goes on.

Marcia's latest passion is something close to her heart, she is the Chairperson of the Dementia-Alzheimer's Resource Committee of St. Clair County. After her husband was diagnosed with Alzheimer's, she knew that more research needed to be done to fight against this terrible disease. The committee is currently working vigorously to raise enough money to bring an adult day care center to Marine City.

No matter what group Marcia is a part of she is always putting her best foot forward. Her contributions have made a long lasting impression on our city. She is always a supportive, witty, enthusiastic individual, driven to preserve our important history. Our community has truly been blessed to have such a giving, selfless citizen. We commend Marcia Haynes for her efforts and thank her for all her contributions over the years.
